Port News Exaggerates "Crime in Manorhaven"

Police Statistics and Commanding Officer Dispute Article

The August 19th issue of the *Port Washington News* ran an article by Dolores Kazanjian O'Brien titled *Orchard Beach Boulevard Business Burglarized*. The Port News article may cause concern among Village residents and may affect the reputation of our Village as a good place to live. To set the record straight, I have assembled here everything that the Village knows about violations of the law within the Village and what is being done to keep our Village safe and comfortable. This information consists of three documents: 1) a letter the Commanding Officer of the 6th Precinct sent to Ms. O'Brien and the Port News editor in response to the Port News article, 2) an e-mail the Commanding Officer sent to me in response to a telephone conversation I had with him, and 3) the Police statistics for the year so far (January to August). I hope this will give you enough information to make up your own mind.

Here is the letter to Ms. O'Brien care of the Port Washington News:

September 8, 2004

Dear Ms. O'Brien:

As the Commanding Officer of the Sixth Precinct, Nassau County Police, I must take issue with your story, "Orchard Beach Boulevard Business Burglarized," which appeared in the Port Washington News dated August 19, 2004.

Reading the story, I feel you gave your readers the false impression that crime in the Village of Manorhaven is out of control. Nothing could be further from the truth.

I point specifically to your quoting the victim of a burglary, "There has been a lot of vandalism around here." This begs the question, what is "a lot" of vandalism. It is usually customary to ask for a police response. I would have appreciated a phone call for a reply to this statement, which you most certainly would have gotten.

Another part of the story states "The NCPD was unable or unwilling to confirm or deny the suspected arson, nor did they provide any information about the perpetrators" First of all, let me explain that I was assigned to the Nassau County Police Department's Public Information Office on four occasions, during one of which I was the Deputy Commanding Officer and on two other instances during which I was the Commanding Officer. When serving directly under four Commissioners of Police in the Nassau County Police Department, my primary responsibility was to act as the Department spokesperson on a daily basis. In my eleven years serving in Public Information Office, I never heard of or read that the Nassau County Police Department was "unable or unwilling to confirm or deny." There are definitely occasions when we are unable to comment on particular situations due to Department policy. However, these cases are rare and oftentimes are court cases in active litigation; we would unquestionably explain the reasons why we could not speak to certain issues with the press. In my thirty-one years as a Nassau County police officer, I have neither heard of nor experienced a situation in which we would not verify a criminal act since this information is covered by Fair Trial-Free Press

and is most certainly information that the public would be entitled to through representatives of the press. I would have appreciated an opportunity to clarify issues regarding this particular case, which at this time is being investigated by the Detective Division.

The second part of the same paragraph states, "The detective..., who preferred to remain nameless, confirmed..." The policy of the Nassau County Police Department is that there are no "off the record" interviews and further, I have never, in my vast experience in dealing with the media seen this type of phraseology. Either the detective or police officer consents to an interview and is named or a "law enforcement source is cited." If a law enforcement source is cited, it is customary to attempt to verify the information that was provided. As far as I am aware, no attempt was made to test the veracity of the information. I would suggest that the reason a name was not used was because the individual is not a member of the Nassau County Police Department. I can assure you that it was not a Nassau County Detective who provided this information, and as such, sources from outside this Department commenting on Nassau County Police Department cases should be approached with caution and their statements be verified through Nassau County Police Department officials. In addition, this Department would not glibly comment on the hypothetical possibility of gang involvement.

I would also question the statement that, "...there have been many incidents in Manorhaven," referring to gang activity. What do you define as many incidents? Is it two, three, four, twenty? I would have been happy to clarify crime and gang issues with you had you asked for a response from this Department.

I also take issue with your statement that your newspaper has received a number of calls, "...about crime in Manorhaven from local residents." This is an interesting statement, because I would have also thought that you would have wanted an official response from me rather than speaking to individuals outside my Department. If you had called, I would have told you that since the beginning of the year, Nassau County Police have been very active in the Manorhaven community working with Mayor Nicholas Capozzi to reduce incidences of crime and attack issues affecting quality of life. There is no crime wave in this community. Nassau County Sixth Precinct police officers have made twenty-five arrests most notably for the crimes of burglary and robbery, however, we have made a number of inroads concerning quality of life violations.

Here is an e-mail to me from Commander Matuza. Stan,

Since the beginning of this year the Sixth Precinct has made 25 arrests in the Village of Manorhaven. These arrests span the gamut from an arrest for robbery (the criminal act actually occurring in the Village of Port Washington), an arrest for a business burglary- to quality of life arrests dealing with drug possession and consuming alcohol in public. The men and women of the Sixth Precinct are committed not only to maintaining the high quality of life that exists in our communities, but improving on it. The Sixth Precinct, in cooperation with the Manorhaven Building Department, the Code Enforcement and the Town of Hempstead Parks Department has had a direct and positive impact on gang activity in the Manorhaven area. Since June of this year we have made 8 gang related arrests and issued 13 appearance tickets to individuals with ties to gangs. We continue our active stance with the village in the enforcement of illegal housing ordinances and we are proactive in handling unlawful assembly of individuals. We still have active investigations in this area, and because of the law enforcement sensitivity of these cases I, unfortunately, cannot elaborate at this time. This initiative against gangs is part of Nassau County Police Commissioner James Lawrence's countywide plan to impact gangs wherever they are. This program has the full support of the County Executive, Thomas Suozzi, and continues to meet with success on a broad scale across the County. This Department has and continues to work with local governmental and police entities to foster a combined front in order to eradicate gang activity. We have in the past, and continue in the present to work with community residents and leaders to make the quality of life better and safer for all.

Here are the Police Statistics

Each month the Village receives a report from the Police Department which is made available to the public at the Board of Trustees Meeting. I reviewed the reports for January through August and compiled the totals for the Village. I went to the Police Web site where I got the totals for the entire 6th Precinct and for Nassau county. The totals are as follows:

The other communities in the 6th precinct that our statistics are being compared to are: Great Neck, Manhasset, Roslyn, Roslyn Harbor, Roslyn Estates, Munsey Park, Flower Hill, Plandome, Plandome Manor, Sea Cliff, Glen Head, Glenwood Landing, Greenvale, and East Hills.

If you review the number of incidents in Manorhaven with those of the entire precinct and of Nassau County, you can see Manorhaven compares very favorably. There will always be people who commit criminal acts. It's good to know that the 6th Precinct is working hard to keep Manorhaven safe and to help maintain our quality of life.

Board of Trustees Actions

We publish a detailed list of all Board of Trustees actions so that you will know what actions your elected officials have taken or are considering. Your editor tries to explain the resolutions and the proposed Local Laws, but some are too complicated or too long to fully describe, so you might feel that you need more information than we provide here. Every proposed local law, every resolution, every document that this Newsletter mentions or refers to, is available at the Village Hall.

- Under the Freedom Of Information Law, you have the right to obtain a copy of any document that exists in the Village files (except for documents that pertain to litigation and personal records). To get a copy you must fill out a request, called a FOIL. The Freedom of Information Law specifies how long the Village can take to provide you with a copy of the document you requested, and the law sets the fee that you must pay for each document the Village copies for you.

NOTES:

- If a Board action described below refers to an Introductory Local Law, or a SEQR determination, see page 3 for a description of the law and information about SEQR.
- If a Board action described below is also covered elsewhere in this newsletter in more detail, there is usually a reference to the page containing the information.
- Most proposed resolutions are voted for or against unanimously, so this Newsletter does not record how trustees voted. If a vote was not unanimous the Trustees who voted Nay will be recorded.
- Mayor Capozzi's policy is not to vote unless there is a tie among the Trustees. He believes that since he is chair of the meeting, and does not introduce resolutions (by NY State Law, all resolutions must be introduced by a Trustee), he should keep the appearance of impartiality that a chair should show. However, if the Mayor votes to break a tie, or if he votes because he believes an issue is so important that he wants his position known, his vote will be recorded here.

May 26, 2004 Regular Meeting

- Resolved to make an intra-budget transfer of \$378.34 from the Capital Fund to the General Fund Balance, due to the settlement of Lot 7.
- Resolved to levy taxes for the ensuing year using the taxable assessed value as shown in the April 1, 2004 Nassau County Final Assessment Roll and the Adjusted Base Proportions for the April 1, 2004 Nassau County Final Assessment Roll as certified by the Nassau County Legislature on May 4, 2004 with the following rates per \$100 of the assessed valuation:

•Resolved to removal of two trees in front of 61 Juniper Road.

•Scheduled a public hearing for June 23, 2004, at 7:30 pm, to hear the application of Payam Farahan and Soamil Youssefia for sub-division of an 8000 square foot lot into two lots of 4000 square feet for property at 23 Hickory Road.

•Resolved to finalize, accept, and file the Village of Manorhaven's Stormwater Management Annual Report.

June 10, 2004 Special Meeting

- Resolved to extend the provisions of Local Law 8, 2004, through August 31, 2004. This is the moratorium on new construction in the I2 and I3 zones while the new zoning regulations are being considered.
- To make it possible for the public to pay court fines by credit card: resolved to authorize the Board of Trustees to provide for the acceptance of credit cards as a means of payment of Village Court fines and other civil penalties imposed by the court; and that the Court Clerk and/or his/her designee shall be the sole Village officers authorized to process such credit card payments.

June 23, 2004 Public Hearing for Subdivision

- Heard a request to subdivide the 8,000 square foot property at 23 Hickory Road into two 4,000 square foot lots. The owner's intent is to construct two 2-family homes. The owner believes that he will require variance from the Zoning Board for lot coverage and roof height.

June 23, 2004 Regular Meeting

- Resolved to adopt a resolution in support of an application made by the Town of North Hempstead for an Environmental Protection Fund Waterfront Rediscovery Grant for the development of a unified BayWalk Park. The proposed park will create a continuous 1.7 mile public corridor from the South end of the Town Dock Park, and will continue along the shoreline of Sunset Park through the villages of Baxter Estates, Port Washington North and Manorhaven's undeveloped waterfront along Sheets Creek North and will end at the west end on the Town's Manorhaven Park. This resolution does not constitute a financial commitment on the part of the Village. The BayWalk will enable the consolidation of all the restoration efforts of the three villages, the Town, Nassau County and the State that have been recently completed or are now underway. The BayWalk will significantly increase public access to Manhasset Bay. It will provide a safe path for walking, jogging, and nature observation as well as creating improved access to the water for canoeing and kayaking. Activities along the way will include observation-sitting areas with wonderful vistas as well as other leisure and recreational amenities.

July 28, 2004 Annual Organizational Meeting

- Set the Annual Meeting of the Board of Trustees for July 27, 2005.
- Designated the 4th Wednesday of each month, 8pm, at the Village Hall, as the time and place of the regular meeting of the Board of Trustees.
- Designated Newsday as the Official Newspaper of the Village.
- Designated HSBC Bank USA and CLASS MBIA as the depository of Village monies.
- Resolved that the Village Treasurer, Mayor, and/or Budget Officer is authorized to invest and re-invest monies received by the Village in the various General and Capital Funds, which are not appropriated to any particular purpose or are not immediately required to be expended for the purpose for which they were appropriated, in Certificates of Deposit, Day of Deposit Day of Withdrawal Savings, Treasury Notes, Money Market of CLASS MBIA investment accounts at the best interest rates available in the banking institutions designated as depositories of Village Monies. Resolved that these investments shall be in accordance with applicable laws, rules and regulations of the State of New York and the United States Government.
- Designated the following Village officials as authorized signatories and co-signatories on the general fund account and capital fund accounts of the Village, in order of their availability:
 - Treasurer and Mayor sign individually
 - Deputy Treasurer and Mayor
 - Deputy Treasurer and Budget Officer
 - Deputy Mayor and Deputy Treasurer
- Authorized payment in advance of audit, claims for the following recurring charges: VERIZON, AT&T, LIPA, AVAYA, NEWCOURT (computer lease), Pitney Bowes (postage), insurance premiums, payroll and monthly retainer for legal services of the Village Attorney.
- Authorized the Mayor, Board of Trustees, Village Clerk-Treasurer, Deputy Clerk/Treasurer, Village Justice, Acting Village Justice, Clerk to the Justice and Superintendent of Building, to attend various meetings and conferences during the coming fiscal year and to be reimbursed for actual and necessary expenses.

- Authorized the Village Clerk to solicit competitive bids for the improvement of parts of Ashwood Road, Edgewood Road and Firwood Road, and authorized Sidney B. Bowne & Son, LLP, consulting engineers to the Village, to prepare bid and technical specifications in connection with the project and to coordinate the solicitation and receipt of the competitive bids.

- Board declared itself lead agency in connection with Introductory Local Law J-2004.(See SEQR Determination).

SEQR Determination

SEQR is the NY State Environmental Quality Review law. This law requires the lead agency to determine whether an environmental review is required before completing an action such as developing a property or creating a new Village Law. The SEQR law contains a list of actions that require certain environmental reviews. Before taking any of these actions, such as passing a local law, the Village must make a SEQR determination. In most cases the Village determines that it is the lead agency, and then as the lead agency, the BOT determines whether the action which it is planning to take is listed under the SEQR law. If an action is not listed, the action is usually considered as not having a significant impact on the environment. Most of the time the Village determines an action is "unlisted", however a recent "listed" action was the determination that the development of the Thypin property could have a significant environmental impact, and therefore certain studies and approvals are required before development of the property can begin.

Introductory Local Laws

G-2002 Enterprise District

This law replaces the industrial zones (I1 and I2) on Manhasset Isle with an Enterprise zone consisting of a mixture of commercial and residential properties. This proposal has had several hearings and work sessions and is still under consideration. Because of the importance and scope of this proposed rezoning, the Village has retained Frederick P. Clark and Associates, an independent Planning/Development/Environment/Transportation consulting firm located in Rye, NY and Fairfield, CT, to review the Proposed Introductory Local Law, the Village Zoning Map, the Village Code, the Local Waterfront Revitalization Program (LWRP) and any base mapping and aerial photography that is available. They will inspect the properties and take photographs for analysis and presentation purposes and will prepare a draft of their proposed suggested revisions to the Introductory Local Law. They will also prepare an expanded Full Environmental Assessment Form for the Village to comply with SEQRA if one is needed.

Local Law 8 (was Introductory Local Law A-2004) was approved in order to place a moratorium on new construction in the industrial zones while the new zoning regulations are being considered.

J-2004 Indemnification of Employees

This law adds members of the Architectural Review Board to the current law that is in the Employees Chapter of the Village Code.

K-2004 Temporary Moratorium

Introductory Local Law A-2004 established a moratorium on new construction in the industrial zones while Introductory Local Law G-2002 was being considered. Local Law A, when approved, became Local Law 8. The moratorium expired at the end of August and Local Law K-2004 seeks to extend the moratorium.

GARBAGE RULES TO BE STRICTLY ENFORCED VIOLATORS WILL FACE FINES

Village garbage disposal is becoming very expensive because people are discarding contractor materials or putting out too many garbage cans. The Village has to pay the "tipping fees" for these items.

Contractor materials are not allowed. This includes materials that the homeowner discards when working on his own property, not just materials discarded by contractors.

On any garbage pickup day, you are allowed **no more than three garbage containers.**

You may put out **one** heavy item, such as furniture, refrigerators, etc., **on the second day** of your pickup. Call Dejana at 944-7445 to arrange for the pickup of a bulk item before you put it out.

Some people are ignoring the rules that help keep our village clean and sanitary. Only yard waste may be put out in plastic bags. **Garbage must be placed in a container with the lid firmly on.**

If you put garbage out in plastic bags you will face a fine. Plastic bags are unsightly; and rodents, squirrels, and possums can easily tear them open. This not only makes a mess, but encourages undesirable rodents to remain in the area.

Findings & Squibs

How quickly time flies, summer is almost over. I hope those of you who have vegetable gardens have reaped a better crop than I have. Few hot days and a lot of rain made it a challenge for many of the summer crops to mature before they rotted. But, in a way, the weather was a boon for the Village as the road crew was able to get many road repairs done a lot easier than if we had blistering heat. Those rainy days were useful also as the crew had time to paint, and work on our road equipment which constantly needs up-keep and conditioning. If we don't continually service and condition our trucks and road equipment now, we cannot rely on them during the winter months where we need them the most. We hope that we will be able to break ground for the building of a garage so we will not have to leave our expensive equipment to the mercy of Mother Nature. We hope this will be the last winter they have to be exposed to the harsh weather.

The Nassau County Police have vacated the booth located on Ashwood Road and we can now prepare to move the booth to its new home near Graywood Road on Manorhaven Blvd. The Town and the Village agreed that was the best place for the booth because it is more centered on Manorhaven Boulevard and closer to Manorhaven Park. Police will have a chance to better address issues at the park during the spring and summer months when there are hundreds of people there every day. It also gives the Police a better idea of what is happening on the entire Boulevard in the evening.

Soon after the 80x100 foot portion of the Ashwood property closes, we will begin to create a pocket park on the remainder of the property. We will receive a matching grant from the Port Washington Business Improvement District to help defer the construction costs, which we believe will be done mostly in-house. We plan an entire new brick/block sidewalk starting at the curb, new plantings augmented by plants that were donated for the site, and two or three old-style street lanterns and either benches or a gazebo. It will be a fine addition to Manorhaven Blvd. This perhaps will spur the beginning of an entire new look for the rest of the Blvd.

We have made some changes at the Village Hall. We appointed a new Clerk and a new Treasurer. With these appointments we hope to continue a high level of service with each member of the staff able to concentrate on their strong points.

The summer schedule for the Village Hall ended on Labor Day. Check the back page of the Newsletter or the Village web site for the hours. I have extended the office hours for your convenience twice in three years in order to serve you better. We will be tracking the traffic at the front window to see if you are taking advantage of the extended hours. If I see that you are not, we will again adjust the hours to more closely mirror the real usage. Monday Nights with the Mayor and Saturday Mornings with the Mayor will resume in the month of September. You may also see those dates on the back page or on the web site.

The Fall of 2004 will be an active time for the Village and the Board, we have some very important issues to move on, including the continuing hearings on development of the Villas on Manhasset Bay, the decision on the Enterprise Zone to rid

the Village of Industrial Zoning, the beginning of the reconditioning of some of our sewer lines (now that the Infiltration study is finally over) and the formation of plans for the completion of the Manorhaven Wildlife Preserve Walkway, now that we own all the necessary property to complete it.

We are entering into an agreement with the Town and others agencies to share some of the necessary tasks and plans for building and maintaining the park. We have renewed all of the Grants that were obtained by the former administration ten years ago, but that could not be used until the lawsuits were over. We will be the recipients of additional grants with help from the Town, so that the work and the cost does not burden the taxpayers. This will all be able to happen because of cooperation between the Municipalities, civic groups, and private and business people. I will continue to strive to reach out to anyone willing to lend a hand to complete the Wildlife Preserve.

The Village is taking another step to help keep speeding down on our streets. We had a demonstration of two traffic control machines that track cars and trucks, and yes, buses, that speed on our roads. Village residents as well as visitors do the speeding and the violations that are given prove this. It seems that some people do not get the message to slow down, so we will enlighten them as to what speed they are traveling at and hope they will understand the dangers they subject our residents to when they speed.

I informed Inspector Matusa that we would be willing to sponsor a policeman so they could get radar gun certification for use on our streets in Manorhaven. We will continue to look seriously into the cure for vehicular infractions. Recently we were asked by a resident to consider lowering the speed limit, we will study the request and inform you if we want to go ahead with the suggestion.

We also have to review what can be done concerning homes that have illegal apartments. Len Baron (Building Superintendent) and I have been working on this for months and we now feel that we have a good remedy for dealing with this problem without treading on anyone's civil rights or targeting any social, economic or ethnic groups within the Village, as was done in the past. There seems to be a renewed resurgence by a small group of so-called concerned residents to target certain types of people and homes and homeowners. While we work on this problem we will not allow their hysteria to affect the high and ever increasing property values we continue to enjoy in this village.

We feel that our current laws only allow us to give a slap-on-the-wrist to homeowners who disregard our Zoning Laws. We need to pass new laws that will allow the Village to impose heavy fines for first time offenders, heavier fines for repeat offenders, and perhaps the revocation of Certificates of Occupancy to multiple offenders. Notice I said offenders, which means the owners of the property with violations, not at just one address but at their multiple addresses. As we know, there are many individuals who own multiple homes and property within the Village. We will link the fines to the offenders. In so doing, we hope those who violate the Health, Safety and Zoning laws will understand that they will no longer get away with a small fine and no other consequences for their lack of consideration for the taxpayers. We plan to share any information that is legally at our disposal with other mu-

nicipalities and government agencies. I will ask the Board to issue a short amnesty for those who want to clear up their violations before the Village steps in. We intend to have the laws specify a mandatory fine connected with each infraction so that there will be little room for the courts to either lessen or excuse a fine as in the past.

I believe that if a person has monetarily gained from illegal uses at their property and has not paid the proper taxes to the Village, Town, County and Federal governments, they should be properly fined and pay some type of restitution to the residents who do follow the law.

I believe these reforms can be accomplished without offending or blaming any one type of people, resident, landlord or property owner

This summer, while I took walks and drives throughout the Village, I was approached by residents complaining or questioning certain things that occurred in the Village. Most of the time their concerns were AFTER something occurred. When I explained that these things were discussed at Village Board, BZA, or ARB hearings they seemed to be dumbfounded. While those of you who know me know how I love to engage in discussions with almost anyone, I am amazed that so many people do not know what goes on. This Village has one of the best notification systems in Nassau County. With our regular newsletter, posting boards, and advertising in Newsday, we inform you of everything that goes on.

The only answer to this problem is that if you are interested in the future of this village or of your block, attend a few Board meetings, call the office, ask questions, contact one of the Board members. **Do not rely on street rumors. Do not rely on someone who's guessing.** Rumors, and people who just want to fire up a potential issue, never have the proper answer. I urge you to attend meetings, read official notices, get the proper answers from the Village office. Don't be a rumor monger because street talk is wrong almost all of the time. Wrong decisions made because of false statements and rumors usually cannot be undone. Too much of this goes on in the Village. I believe it is mostly innocent idle talk, but too many people seem to be misinformed or informed way after the fact. Most of these items concern new home development or Zoning Issues. Please stay informed so you have the opportunity to voice your feelings before something happens that you disagree with.

I implore you to keep informed about what goes on in your Village, read the information that we give you through the newsletter, on the posting boards or by speaking to one of the members of the Board or office staff. Look at the zoning notices mailed to your home for new development and look in NEWSDAY each Sunday in the North Hempstead section for dates of board meetings. We have been listing these meetings in the paper since this administration took office and it is at no cost to the taxpayer but done as a public service.

Until next time I hope you have a healthy and happy Fall Season. We are beginning to plan some fun events for the next few months, we hope many of you will join us in their planning and execution. I just want to thank all of you who continually follow our Village regulations and I hope you will encourage your neighbors to do the same. As always I am at your service.

Editor's Comments

The recent election campaign was, in some ways, worse than any previous campaign that I can remember in my 26 years in this Village. Previously, the people who opposed the current administration had mostly resorted to untruths about the conditions in the Village. Here are the kinds of things they did:

- They made a long series of false complaints about the state of the Village's financial records, including articles in the Port News. This did not end until the Village and State auditors clearly showed that the discrepancy they were complaining about was left over from their own administration.
- They lied about the Village forfeiting the escrow account on Lot 7. This did not end until the the Town and Dejana Industries completed their negotiations.
- They made many (about 100) false accusations to the police about the Mayor, which resulted in several years of investigation by the DA, a waste of tax money and Village employees time, and the smearing of the Mayor's name in every election by claiming that he was under investigation by the DA. Needless to say, the investigations resulted in the DA's conclusion that "there was no credible evidence to support the continuation of a criminal investigation against any individual or corporate entity regarding the Village of Manorhaven".
- They claimed that "tax dollars spent illegally on a Village Newsletter that contains political rhetoric and distortions." but never showed that anything that was printed in this paper was illegal, untrue, or even distorted.
- They claimed that the Village had "An unnecessary phone emergency notification system installed for \$5,000.Appears to be a political move to collect data about village residents."
- Someone sent a letter to County Executive Suozzi that said I saw two policemen sitting in their patrol car reading a magazine instead of doing their job. The letter had my signature forged on it.

This election was different. This election they pulled out all the stops and did everything they could to smear Mayor Capozzi in an attempt to destroy his name and your respect for him. Their literature was disgusting, but apparently many people believed it.

Up till now, every false claim that was made could be answered. When they made false claims about our financial records, forfeiting an escrow account, allegations of criminality, facts about what is printed in this newspaper, and so on, we were able to present the auditor's report, the agreement with the Town, the DA's report, and so on. This past election, they made exaggerated claims about crime in this Village, and Ms. O'Brien, recently wrote a misleading article in the Port News to help keep those allegations alive. The first page of this Newspaper shows that there are factual answers to those false claims too.

But what about the disgusting smears on the Mayor? How does he answer the charges that he is connected with pornography, promotes sex with children, is connected with organized crime, and so on? If someone claimed that about you, how would you disprove it? Would you say the charges aren't true and expect everyone to believe you? Would you get a letter from someone that said that the charges aren't true and expect everyone to believe that person? (and who would you find to vouch for you that everyone would believe?) When you think about it, if someone calls you a crook, you cannot prove that you are not a crook. All you can do is say "show me the evidence that backs up your claim."

Many people think that when someone is slandered, all they have to do is go to court and win a big libel suit. They may think that if there is no suit, the charges must be true. But think about this: You have to prove that the slander cost you something. In Mayor Capozzi's case, the judge would probably determine that since he won the election and did not lose his job or friends he wasn't damaged, except to his pride. Libel suits are almost a hopeless solution unless you are very rich and can afford to pay a lot more to sue than you are ever going to get from the people you are suing.

For this reason, I wanted to dissuade Mayor Capozzi from writing the "June 2004" article in the column on the right. I told him that just because he would claim that he isn't the things they said about him doesn't prove he isn't. I told him that if someone said those things about me, I couldn't disprove them either. I thought that his article would be a waste of time and would make people who read it wonder whether he had anything to hide because he's defending himself instead of suing for libel.

Mayor Capozzi told me that his real concern is with the Village. He has worked hard for many years to make the Village a better place to live and has seen property values increase, new residents with young families, and new businesses move into the Village. He is very upset at the negative publicity that these unscrupulous charges created and the possible impact on the Village's reputation.

So although in his "June 2004" article, Mayor Capozzi tries to assure you that the disgusting statements about him are false, what he is really hoping to do is educate all the new members of our community about what has been going on and to urge them not to accept rumors and allegations without some kind of real proof. He wants to defend our Village against those few people who hate him so much that they don't care how their venom affects the reputation of the Village.

June 2004

Last June was probably one of the lowest points in Manorhaven's History. We've been working hard for eight years to overcome the undeservedly poor reputation our Village had. We thought we turned the corner and brought our Village out of the political low it has been in for many years. We were wrong. Therefore I must let you know, especially our newer residents, who may be unfamiliar with the past, just what happened; why I believe a real change is needed, and why it can only happen if we all work to make it so.

Over the past eight years this Village has seen a large, and for the most part, good growth. For many years, starting in the late eighties and early nineties, older residents that lived here for years wrestled with the thought of moving to either a warmer climate or to a place where school and other taxes were more moderate. The Village property values had declined or were stagnant due to many reasons, including lack of maintenance, overcrowded apartments, the reputation that it was hard to deal with the village administration, and that new people and new businesses were not welcome in Manorhaven.

In its first few years the Pagano administration was able to get the overcrowded and illegal apartment situation under control for the most part; however the means they used were perhaps extreme. Excessive numbers of summons were given out, video cameras were used on unsuspecting residents, and they projected an attitude that only certain people were wanted in the Village and that businesses were not welcome unless they passed a certain litmus test. While the Pagano administration did clear up many of the overcrowded and illegal homes, they also brought on an overwhelming sense of fear of the village government and resentment from many residents. That changed about eight years ago, when for the first time in over three election cycles, the Board was not made up of only one party. The following year a new administration was elected by a slim margin. Over the next two years policies which seemed to be in place for only a few changed, and the Village was open for new businesses and new residents; the wall around the Village came down, spurred by new policies. Building and growth began to happen after a year or so and we now have high property values and many new businesses.

So enough of the history lesson, except to explain that each of the past three mayoral elections have become not an election of Ideas, or Policies, but more and more that of character assassinations and out and out mistruths. It seems like anything goes for a few people in our Village.

Now for June 2004: Many of you were bombarded with a great amount of paper either mailed or dropped on your property by young children running through the streets. Much of it consisted only of character assassinations against your Mayor and his running mates. Right from the beginning, from the first time I ran for office as a Trustee, the Justice/Concerned group never debated me about my ideas. Instead, they hired a Private Detective to chase me around. When they were asked why, they said it was because I was new to the Village and they didn't want just anyone to run. During each election since then we have never heard of any new or innovative ideas from this group, just falsehoods and assassinations of character. That is why I must clear up much of the mud and the out and out lies that were distributed to your homes this past June, and spread by the candidates, their friends, and the vicious and vindictive people who nominated and supported them.

It's almost too exhausting to go through the smears that day after day arrived on your door step, so I will zero in on only the most grievous ones that this group thought you would buy and hoping you believed them, would vote against me. I can categorically say to you that each one of the following accusations that were made against me and were spread by the so called Reform/Justice/Concerned group is false. Nor have they any evidence to back up their falsehoods.

I am not the Port Washington Chairperson of any web site organization connected with any type of pornography; I am not involved with any group or any society that promotes sex with children; I do not have any connection with any organized crime families; I do not own any property in Europe that was paid for with public monies or anyone's money; I am not a thief, nor do I lie to the residents of this Village about any business that goes on in this Village; I do not fix contracts for my friends; I do not have anyone buy or pay for my automobiles or my clothing; I am not under investigation by any law enforcement agency anywhere!

I hope you will not allow this kind of obscene and dirty type of politics to ever happen again in this Village, whether it is directed against me or anyone else. I believe that we must inform the residents of this Village if they are being lied to. I hope you read the flyers I sent to you which always had my name and the names of my running mates on them. I hope you noted the names of those who nominated these three candidates who smeared me, my running mates, and the Village. These are the same people that year after year create havoc during the election process in Manorhaven.

Now that it is all over we can move on. We will continue our efforts to bring new businesses and new residents to Manorhaven and to create conditions so that our property values continue to remain high.

While we would all like "The Good Old Days," if we do not change we will die, as many Villages and Hamlets have done in the past. I believe this is a wonderful place to live and I hope we continue to improve and prosper. As the world changes so must we.

Garbage Policy

Here is a brief summary of the Garbage regulations. You can pick up the complete regulations at the Village Hall.

One Family Home: Up to three 30 gallon trash containers, weighing up to 50 pounds each, per pickup

Two Family Home: Up to six 30 gallon trash containers, weighing up to 50 pounds each, per pickup.

Recyclables: You may put out your recyclables (newspapers, bottles, cans, etc.) whenever garbage is scheduled to be picked up.

Complaints: If you have a problem with your garbage pickup, the contractor must correct the problem within 4 hours.

Bulk Pickup. If you need to schedule a bulk pickup, or make a complaint, call DeJana Industries at 944-3100.

The following regulations will be STRICTLY enforced:

- All regular trash must be in watertight containers with the lid on.

Loose plastic bags of trash are not acceptable.

- Items to be picked up must be left on your property, not in the street.
- Make sure that your address is printed on your container.
- Do not put out hazardous waste, volatile materials, propane tanks, bricks, asphalt, concrete, granite, marble, and all other stone and stoneware, lime, asbestos, automobile parts (engines, transmission, rear ends, auto body parts, etc.), pipes, infectious and biological waste, full paint cans (you may put out empty latex cans if they are dried out), logs larger than 4" x 4" or longer than 4 feet, chain link fences and cables.
- Do not put any items out at the curb before 5 pm** (preferably after sundown) of the day before pickup.
Some people are putting trash out at the curb much earlier than allowed. If trash is put out too early a summons must be issued, which can result in a fine.
- Contractors must dispose of any debris that they generate.

ARE YOU PREPARED FOR A HURRICANE?

The very damaging hurricanes in Florida are in the news, but we should not forget that Long Island has been, and will be, the site of dangerous hurricanes. They don't come often, but when they do they can cause severe damage to your property and threaten your life. Here are some checklists to help you plan:

Prepare an Evacuation Kit Now:

Make a list of the things that you want to take with you if you must evacuate your home. Make sure they are readily available if you have to assemble an evacuation kit. These items include:

- Vitamins, medications you are taking, prescriptions for renewal
- Your ID and personal documents that you don't want to lose: passports, insurance papers, credit cards, etc.
- First aid kit, with the first aid manual
- Toilet paper, wash-and-dry towlettes, wipes, soap, towels, etc.
- Baby food and diapers
- Pet food
- Sleeping bags or blankets.
- Flashlight and extra batteries for each person
- Portable radio and extra batteries
- Cards, games, books, etc.
- Cell phone, address book
- Maps of the area.
- Clean change of clothes
- Bottled water, non-perishable food, snacks, powdered or canned milk, can opener.
- Matches
- Eyeglasses, contact lenses, etc.
- Raingear.
- Work gloves, portable all-in-one tool.
- Extra money, coins.
- An easy to carry bag, box, backpack, or other container for the items that you need. Each person can carry a pack of his personal items and the other items can be shared among everyone.

You should have the following items readily accessible at home:

- Fire extinguisher.
- Portable radio so you can hear emergency instructions even if the power is out.
- Inexpensive rabbit ear TV antenna in case Cable TV goes out.
- Rain gear, sturdy boots that resist water.
- Non-perishable food.
- Can opener, matches.

If you hear an advisory:

- Keep listening to forecasts and possible warnings.
- Get your evacuation kit together.
- Check outside your house for loose items. Bring them in or tie them down.
- If you are going to a shelter, make arrangements for your pets; because shelters may not allow them.
- Check up on elderly or disabled family, friends and neighbors.
- Get your house ready (close windows, assemble items you would need if power goes out, including matches to light stove, fire extinguisher, etc.)

If You Must Evacuate:

- Prepare to leave as soon as possible. Plan your primary route, and an alternate route in case the primary one is blocked.
- Unplug appliances, turn of electricity at the circuit breaker panel, and turn off the main water valve.
- Tell someone outside of the storm area where you are going.
- If time permits, and you are in a flood zone, move furniture and other important items to a higher floor.
- Gather your emergency kit and make sure each person has his or her own kit.
- Dress in appropriate clothing. You will probably need warm clothing, boots and raingear.

The Village does not spend any money on this festival. Many Village employees and the Mayor and Trustee volunteer their time. Donations from individuals, businesses, and community organizations make the festival happen.

Our New Staff

Every year the Mayor must make certain appointments, including appointments to the offices of Village Clerk and Village Treasurer. Usually each position also has a deputy, who fills in when the office holder is absent. These appointments are usually for one or two years and they expire at the end of the term. The positions of Clerk and Treasurer expired on June 30th and new appointments were required.

This year Mayor Capozzi reorganized these two positions so that the people who will fill them would be the most qualified for the job, agreeable to the assignments (it was the area each person most wanted to work in) and would most readily meet their personal needs.

It is important to note, that under NY State Law, the Village Clerk is the only unelected officer of the Village; so we are fortunate to have a Village Clerk who is also an attorney. Our new Treasurer has been doing the Village bookkeeping as Deputy Clerk for some time and is familiar with the Village's computer system and records.

Village To Begin Accepting Credit Card Payments

The Village has arranged for the Justice Court to accept payments via Visa or Mastercard. For now, this is the only type of payment that the Village can accept via credit card.

Mayor Capozzi is planning for a resolution of the Board of Trustees that will allow the Village to accept credit cards for payment of taxes, building fees, permit fees, etc.

Mayor Capozzi Assigns New Responsibilities for Emergency Procedures

On September 1, 2004, Mayor Capozzi instituted procedures whereby the Village Hall will be covered in case of an emergency. He and the four Trustees will be responsible for checking the Voice Mail left on the Emergency line and following up where appropriate. Each month a different person will be responsible for checking the voice mail hourly between 6pm and midnight.

Each Trustee will receive a key to the Village Hall and will receive instruction on how to open the Hall, disarm the alarm system, and start the emergency generator.

Village Phone Bill Savings

The Village made an agreement with Phone Review last September to try to save money on the Village's phone bills.

The agreement was that Phone Review would place the Village into a reduced rate calling and access plan offered through NY State for all local and regional services. The Village was not to experience any change in services, only a reduction in the monthly billing.

Phone Review was to arrange all plan reductions with the Village and was responsible to ensure that the proposed billing charges were properly implemented and were billed at the correct rate. The fee for the service was 40% of the monthly savings realized from the plan change implemented for the first 12 months.

This arrangement has resulted in a reduction in the monthly phone bill of about \$163, before the 40% fee is deducted.

This translates to a \$1,177 savings over the year after the fees have been paid. When the contract ends, the Village will keep all future savings.
